Breed Standard

The Australasian Bosdog (originally called the Australian Bulldog) is a healthy animal.

Distinctly 'bulldog' in type yet free of anatomical exaggeration. An Australasian Bosdog should breathe freely, whelp and breed naturally and be uninhibited in its movement.

Smooth coated, thickset, medium sized with powerful build showing strength and agility, an Australasian Bosdog is sound and active.

The Australian Bulldog conveys the impression of strength, activity and stamina and exhibits a trustworthy and enduring disposition.

Loyal, fierce in appearance, but extremely outgoing and affectionate in nature. Very stable and predictable. Enjoys activity, however a lot of exercise is not necessary for health and mental stability. The breed craves human attention. Some may not tolerate aggressive overtures by other dogs.

The head should be large, but not exaggerated or out of proportion to the body. Broad muzzled and short faced, but the nose should be long enough for unhindered breathing. Muzzle is broad and turning up. Muzzle length from tip of nose to stop to be no less than 25mm and no more than 50mm. Loose folds of skin across the nose, but in no way excessively wrinkled. Eyes are set low and wide, never bulging or sunken - preferably without visible haw. Eyes of any colour acceptable. Head circumference should be equal to body height or up to 15% larger for males and equal or up to 10% larger for females.

Ears should be small to moderate size. Set wide apart. Rose or button preferred - never erect or cropped.

Broad jaw. Canines set wide apart. Well occluded incisors. Undershot (but not to excess) to level jaw. Flews are relatively broad and hanging over lower jaw at each side. Teeth should not be obviously protruding. Flews should not be excessive in size and mouth should not be excessively loose.

The neck should be moderate in length; thick, deep and strong with loose skin forming dewlap on either side

Chest wide and deep. Shoulders broad, but not excessively so, rounded ribs. Forelegs powerful and straight, not bandy or curved, well boned, set wide apart presenting a straight front.

Back short and straight giving compact carriage, but not so short as to interfere with activity and agility.
Bitches may have greater body length than males in order to assist natural whelping.
Body shape in general is brick shaped with shoulders only slightly wider than hips.

Body length for males should be equal to height or up to 15% longer.
Body length for females should be between 10% and 25% longer than height. (Body length measuring distance from shoulders to base of tail)

Strong and muscular hindquarters. Hocks slightly bent.
Hip width should be no more than 15% narrower than the shoulders.

Round and compact feet. Excessively splayed feet undesirable.

Thickset tail at root. Straight (long or short), crank, pump-handle tails all acceptable. Screw tails acceptable, but tight screws undesirable.

Balanced, vigorous and uninhibited gait/movement. Should not have rolling gait. Smooth coat, short, tight to body. Any colour acceptable.

NOTE : All males to be defined as entire must have two prominent descended testicles in order to be considered for breeding purposes.

Introduction to ABS

Over the last few decades there have been world-wide efforts to reconstruct or reform the British or English Bulldog.

The Australasian Bosdog (originally called the Australian Bulldog) is a purely Australian vision which has produced a dog instantly recognisable as a 'bulldog' without the anatomical exaggerations to restrict vigour, activity and overall health, while retaining a sound and endearing temperament and personality.

Although possibly fierce in appearance, the Australasian Bosdog never be unstable or aggressive. This dog does not make a good 'guard' dog, an Australasian Bosdog is a people friendly, family dog. It is loyal, extremely outgoing and affectionate in nature, stable and predictable. The ABS Inc. is aware however that bad owners can make bad dogs whatever the breed and actively encourage new owners to attend puppy classes and obedience classes.

The Australasian Bosdog should never be a 'British Bulldog look-alike' having a longer nose, fewer wrinkles, straight back, longer and straight legs, brick shaped body, long or short tail, balanced and uninhibited movement without a rolling gait. It is a medium sized, short-haired, thickset bulldog. Full details including heights and weights are given in the full ABS Inc. Breed Standard (printed later in this pamphlet).

Remember the Australasian Bosdog should be immediately recognisable as a bulldog but is a breed in its own right. Even the most superficial research will show that nearly all modern day purebred dogs have been 'created' over the last few centuries by the crossing and intermingling of dog breeds and individual dogs.

The Australasian Bosdog no different. However the crossing and intermingling of breeds to create the Australasian Bosdog was finished some long time ago. A true Australian Bulldog is never a British Bulldog straight crossed with another breed.
